
On January 1, Governor Kathy Hochul was sworn in as New York's first woman governor on two Bibles, one of which was a 1730 Dutch bible from the Library and Museum collection that belonged to President Roosevelt's greatgrandfather, Jacobus.

The Library and Museum partnered to **host the launch of a new Eleanor Roosevelt quarter**. As part of the US Mint's American Women Quarters Program, the new quarter celebrates her life and legacy as a first lady, author, civil liberties advocate, and chairperson of the United Nations Human Rights Commission.



The Library and Museum's animated film about the Tuskegee Airmen was accepted into the Soho International Film Festival in New York City and was selected as a finalist at the New York Animated Film Festival.

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BLACK AMERICANS, CIVIL RIGHTS, AND THE ROOSEVELTS, 1932-1962

On June 3, the Library and Museum opened a milestone exhibit years in the making. The exhibit received the Award for Excellence from the Greater Hudson Heritage Network (2023); **Dutchess County Historical Society's annual** award, the Dutchess Award (2024); the **Archivist's Achievement Award from the Archivist of the United States for its** development and launch (2024); along with the Dutchess County Executive's Dutchess **Tourism Award of Distinction (2023) not only** for the special exhibit, but for the Library and Museum's ongoing research, public, and education programs that advance tourism in the county and region as well. Additionally, the exhibit has received impressive reviews from The New York Times and Mid Hudson News with other reviews from publications such as The Wall Street Journal. We celebrated opening day with an engaging panel featuring Arva Rice, Basil A. Smikle Jr., and Jill Watts, exploring the themes and current connections of the exhibit. We were thrilled to be joined by New York Lieutenant Governor Antonio Delgado, who gave poignant opening remarks.

In collaboration with a distinguished committee of scholars, *Black Americans*, *Civil Rights, and the Roosevelts, 1932-1962* centers the historical voices of many Black community leaders, wartime service members, and ordinary citizens who engaged the Roosevelt administration directly and who pushed for progress. Within this context, the exhibit examines the political evolution of both Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt regarding racial justice.

From the Great Depression and New Deal, through World War II and the postwar Civil Rights movement, the exhibit offers critical perspectives on, and candid assessments of, the administration's policies and practices, and of the Roosevelts themselves. A compelling story emerges, one of Black Americans organizing and expanding national networks of political allies to create new opportunities for social justice, and to combat Jim Crow segregation, widespread discrimination, and the harsh and often violent realities of racism in America.

The exhibit features documents and artifacts - many on display for the first time - from the Library and Museum's rich holdings and from private collections nationwide. These materials evidence the unrelenting efforts of many key figures of the early civil rights movement, as well as Eleanor Roosevelt's interactions with Black leaders of the midcentury freedom struggle. They also document the racism and discrimination in American politics and culture of the era and highlight the contradictions inherent with fighting for democracy abroad while injustice persists at home. Showcasing some of the most riveting yet unheralded voices from its vast archives of personal letters, political pamphlets, petitions, artworks, photographs, and sound recordings, the Roosevelt Library hopes the exhibit will inspire further research into key aspects of this important history.

Through a robust public/private partnership, the FDR Library and Museum receives support from the federal National Archives and Records Administration and the Roosevelt Institute. Supplementing core public funding from NARA, private funding raised through the Institute supports activities like special exhibits, civics education work, public and community events, and membership programming.

The 2023 budget for the Roosevelt Institute's Library and Museum programming was approximately \$1,361,650.
